#### **Evaluation Policy**

Students will be assessed & evaluated according to the work produced & skills displayed. Methods of providing feedback will include assessing work in process & evaluating completed assignments, tests, co-operative learning activities, simulations and presentations. Peer & self-evaluations will also be utilized. Student marks will be determined by evaluating process & product according to 4 categories & 4 levels.

Feedback will also be provided for student learning skills. Skills like working independently, team work, organization, work habits and homework, and initiative are assessed independently student achievement and will be conducted through the use of a rubric indicating specific criteria to be achieved to receive each of the following letter grades:

E –Excellent

G – Good

S – Satisfactory N - Needs Improvement

#### Other Evaluation Issues:

LATE ASSIGNMENTS: Late Work will be accepted for up to five school days (with a penalty of up to 10%). However, late work will not be accepted if the teacher has already returned the corrected assignment to the class.

STUDENT ABSENCES: Students are responsible for the completion of assignments, notes, reading and tests that were missed during any absence. Students with verified absences (proof of reason) must write missed tests or hand in assignments on the first day back following the absence. Unaccountable absences (ie. skips, truancy) will result in a mark of zero for missed evaluations.
